Dog groomers open shop

Cammie Butt opened her dog grooming business, Furology Educated Grooming LLC, last month at 99 Wildwood in Rio Dell. It was a soft opening as she was painting walls and grooming stations were being set up between clients. But everything one sees is intentional from the name – which speaks to the staff's emphasis on being trained and certified – to the quiet motif of paint and décor, meant to be soothing to the dogs.

Heated towels and filtered bath water are among the touches dogs will experience. "We're going the extra mile, we don't want to be basic," Butt says. She talks about the importance of staff being trained in canine CPR in the event an older dog has a health problem. She will accept large dogs which many groomers do not, and plans include "Pet Parent" workshops to help owners understand the needs of their pets. "Groomers are often first responders" when it comes to identifying health and other problems with animals, she says, because many people only get to the veterinarian once a year but come to the groomer more regularly.

Butt grew up in Rio Dell and was grooming dogs as a child alongside her mom, Sanna Sterling, who learned the skill at a school in Portland and worked in several locations over the years. Butt has worked at several pet salons around the county as well.

She will be assisted by Amber Langford, a multi-generational Humboldt native, who was similarly trimming her own dog's hair as a child and became a dog bather at Petco, going on to training that included an apprenticeship and led to her becoming a certified grooming stylist in 2008. A third member of the team is Sariah Buckley, who has been grooming for a couple years.

Business hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesdays through Saturdays by appointment. Call 707.783.3019. Plans include a senior day and referral discount.

Candle biz started as a class project

His business' Facebook page shows rows of candles, each ensconced in a Mason jar, some jars encased in intriguing textures such as leather or wrapped in sisal. Scents range from last year's favorites, like Cozy Cabin Christmas and Crème Brûlée, to new offerings including Christmas Wreath, Whiskey Kisses, Havana Honey Barrel, Holiday Haze, and a scent for which an online poll was seeking a name, described as conjuring thoughts of "a dimly lit room, rich leather armchairs, the aroma of fine cigars, dry gin, and hints of vanilla and labdanum."

Devin Harris of Rio Dell is the young man behind ZOH Co Candles, a home-based business named for the initials of his three pets and spawned last year as a class project at Redwood Prep, the Fortuna charter school he attended (he is now a freshman at Fortuna High). Students in that class had to pick a product they would make and market, working out the details of where the start-up money would come from and other logistics. Most chose to make candy or baked goods. "How about candles?" asked Harris' mom, Rhonda, picking the idea from a list of suggestions the teacher had provided. Family cat Zoe and Yorkies Oliver and Harley provided the initials that formed the name. The school held an arts and crafts fair where the young entrepreneur sold his goods and netted over \$400. That helped with the decision to continue the business after graduation, something none of the other students seem to have done.

The production process starts with ordering the ingredients, which involves some research to get the best quality and price. Items include the soy wax that comes as a shredded solid that must be melted in a double-boiler to 180 degrees; a variety of scents (examples Butterscotch Bourbon and Sweet Tobacco) that are combined to create new blends; the wicks and Mason jars, and colorings, a new touch this year as last year's production line involved all white candles.

The wicks must be attached to the bottoms of the jars to hold them in place during the pouring; the melted soy wax needs to be cooled somewhat before the scents and coloring are added, and the batch must cure for a couple weeks after being poured.

"We get ideas from all over," Rhonda Harris notes, including from older son Garrett, 24, about the need for more male-nuanced options. She came up with the scent reminiscent of leather armchairs, cigars and gin, from visits with her dad to Myrtlewood Liquors and John's Fine Cigars in Eureka. She's quick to note this is her son's business but enjoys popping in with creative ideas about labeling and presentation. A scheduler for Providence, she works from home making appointments for seven doctors in two counties but enjoys writing and marketing.

This year both 8- and 16-ounce candles will be available at a series of craft fairs including the Fortuna Senior Center, the Stocking Stuffer fair at the Gene Lucas Center, and pop-up opportunities that present themselves including Fortuna's downtown open house last month, as well as at Fortuna Farmhouse, 1122 Main Street. The home-based business can also be reached through the Facebook page and payment methods include Cash App, Zelle and Venmo. Pricing is being finalized but a discount is being considered for people supplying a replacement Mason jar.



Rio Dell woman makes roses from redwood

Monica (Warden) Phillips discovered a new talent last winter, when she started making roses out of redwood. She works at the Ancient Redwoods Gift Shop in Redcrest, owned by chamber members Dean and Susan Lewis, and redwood roses were among the items offered for sale there, but the man who made them stopped doing so, and Phillips set about learning how to fill the gap. She tried several approaches, she said, and had four dozen produced by the time the gift shop and adjacent campground, located at the Immortal Tree on the Avenue of the Giants, reopened for the season this spring. She has been selling them for \$12 each.

Phillips gets the redwood from area beaches, which she notes are regularly littered with logs. Husband Jon shaves off thin sheets of wood as she needs them and she cuts and shapes the flowers, gluing the petals together.

Some are scented, and some are painted in various colors and combinations, for instance acrylic paint mixed with stain to allow the wood look to show through. Each aspect of fabrication has been a learning process. Phillips started making leaves for the stems from redwood as well but found they broke off easily when being handled by shoppers, so she discovered and switched to artificial leaves.

"I make them in my living room," Phillips says of the flowers, since the garage is either too hot or too cold. It takes about a day to make a single flower.

Everything must be put away for safekeeping when the grandchildren come for the weekend. "They are pretty, it's an achievement," she says of the project, and "it's something I set my mind to do." She's open to selling at other locations but needs to build up inventory. Someone wanting a redwood floral gift in the meantime can message her on Facebook.
