Artist Returns to Gallery With Many Styles of Art

Natalya Burke effusively greets visitors to the Eagle Prairie Arts District gallery at Wildwood and Columbus in Rio Dell, in her warm and energetic style explaining the work on display, many pieces of which are her own. They represent a wide range of art media that include encaustic wax (which she explains means ironing wax on paper); watercolor marbling (which requires special tools, paint and paper to achieve the desired effect); painting on both sides of glass (to give a stained glass effect with greater depth); and leatherwork, both of scenes and items such as brooches to affix to clothes or hats.

A native of the Ukraine, she studied and worked in nuclear engineering, then started her own business when the Soviet Union, of which the Ukraine was a part, came undone, resulting in few jobs and lower salaries. She immigrated with her son to the U.S. about 15 years ago, living in Fort Bragg, where she attended a College of the Redwoods campus, taking all the art classes offered.

Member Profile: Harland Law Firm Values Tradition, Family in 71st Year



Harland Law Firm, at 954 Main Street in Fortuna, has been providing legal services to the area since 1946 when Collis Mehan opened the office. Six years later Gerald Harland joined him and when he died in 2012 while still working as a partner, the decision was made to name the firm after him permanently. That respect for "how Jerry did things" still guides the firm today, notes Amy

Mendoza-Stover, the youngest attorney, who joined the currently five-member firm a decade ago, right out of college. Mendoza-Stover, a sixth-generation native of Redwood Valley, where she still lives on a hobby farm, says her dad was a logger and she worked loading logging trucks during her college years. Her initial plans were to major in agriculture, and then business, but mentors who included Roger Rodoni kept encouraging her onward to eventually obtain a law degree as the way she could best help ranchers and loggers. She targeted the Harland firm as her first choice to get a job because Richard Smith, currently the managing partner at the firm, is "the pre-eminent attorney for land use issues in Northern California, if not the whole state," she says. That's an area in which she is very interested, and she wanted to work with, and learn from, such an experienced professional. She was delighted to be chosen for the job and feels part of what made her a good fit in the eyes of Harland and the other decision-makers was that she was a local person returning to seek a career in the area. Scotia Inn needs a new lease on life

This newsletter reported earlier this year the impending closure of Gallagher's Pub in the historic Scotia Inn. Inn manager Wes Paden said at the time that the bar would close January 31 and hopefully reopen with a new name and customer experience. However the whole inn as well as Gallagher's remains closed. A sign on the front door says the closure is for the season, and provides a phone number for more information. Steve Dieky, controller for the Town of Scotia, whose phone number is posted on the sign, reports that the lease for the facility expired January 31 when the tenants chose not to renew, and the inn will only reopen if a new manager steps up to propose a business plan to the town that is approved. Miguel's Restaurant, which formerly sublet its space from the Scotia Inn, is now leasing its facility directly from the Town of Scotia and remains open as before.

Scotia welcomes new fire truck

The Scotia Volunteer Fire Department's newest addition to its two-fire-engine fleet was introduced to the community in an open house event in late February. The *Times-Standard*, reporting on the arrival, notes Scotia Fire Chief John Broadstock said he and the other 13 firefighters in his department are excited to replace a 1977 International Van Pelt fire engine with a newer, safer engine. Costing under \$300,000, the Rosenbauer 2017 RTX Type 1 engine, a type used in structure fires, features a 1,000 gallon water tank and 20-gallon foam tank, as well as a remote control water gun on top of the engine that can be operated without someone climbing up, and risking falling off. It offers additional equipment storage, easier pumping with simplified and computerized systems, and it carries five persons, two more than the engine it is replacing. Broadstock said he has been looking into buying a new fire engine for quite a while and most of the used engines he found were around the same price as this new engine. The old engine it replaces is experiencing mechanical issues so may be sold for parts once it's stripped of all useful fire equipment.

An area she has taken on after Harland's death is his specialty, wills, trusts, and probates, accounting for a very large portion of the firm's varied case load. Mendoza, who is Spanish-speaking, enjoys being able to provide a useful tool to help people from all backgrounds to manage their family resources and plan for the future. "We provide a great service to the community," she says, noting the firm has a Spanish-speaking notary.

While retaining respect for the past, reflected in long-time employees like paralegal Sharon Berti, who has been with the firm for 40 years, the business has changed. At one time there were offices in Crescent City and Ferndale; at present there is a second office in Eureka where Mendoza-Stover, like the firm's other attorneys, divides her time. A new attorney is expected to be brought on board.
