Caught Doing Good: Mary Burns a Main mover in Wildwood Days Car Show

It's a family affair, Mary Burns says often of the car show she produces each year as part of Wildwood Days. The show, which takes place on Sunday morning in front of city hall, typically draws more than 50 cars each year. "We get one of everything," she notes of the range of vehicles that come. "Some are a work in progress, another might be a \$300,000 car." They come from as far away as southern Oregon, Redding and Fort Bragg, but most are local, coming from the Eel River Valley. "Some come back every year, it's like a family," she notes.

Wood Days publicity, Facebook posts done by her granddaughter, Bailey Parker, and posters she mails or hands out at Auto Expo and other car events. "Some, you just catch driving through," she says of drivers who show up for the first time.

"You start the day after it ends to work on the next year," Burns notes, adding that she gets going "real strong" in February. "I can't recall when I started doing this," Burns says, thinking it must be 15 or more years ago. The fire department asked her to manage a car show, and she said she had no idea how to do that. "We had 10 or 12 cars to start," she recalls the early days. Cars have always been in her family, from the M & M Automotive business she ran in Rio Dell with her husband, Mike, for 28 years, to the project car her husband worked on with their high school-aged son. How Antivirus and Antispyware Software Work

Both antivirus and antispyware software monitor your computer for potential threats. If your computer is connected to the internet, you should have a functioning, properly licensed and updated antivirus and antispyware program. At a minimum, the software you choose should offer "real-time" scanning, as well as "scheduled" scanning functionality.

"Real Time" scanning allows the software to continually scan files as they are downloaded to your computer, and will notify you if the file(s) you receive contain malware.

"Scheduled" scanning allows the software to scan all the existing files (or selected files) on your computer hard disk in a systematic effort to locate existing files that "look like" a virus.

- For those of you using Microsoft Windows 7, Microsoft offers a free anti-virus product called Microsoft Security Essentials in 32-bit and 64-bit versions. It can be used by home users and small businesses with up to 10 computers.
- For those of you using Microsoft Windows 8 or higher, Windows Defender comes integrated with the operating system and provides antivirus and antispyware protection.
- Both Microsoft Security Essentials and Windows Defender come at no additional cost there's nothing to buy, no subscriptions and no nagware yeah I know, awesome!

Most antivirus and antispyware tools can identify suspicious software based on a list of known threats called "definitions." Definitions should be updated automatically by the software and new updates should be provided when new threats are discovered.

Preventing Infection with Antivirus and Antispyware Software

Antivirus and antispyware software are basic tools that no home or business should be without.

In short, a single antivirus program, a single antispyware program and a single configured firewall is adequate. Installing more than one of any of these programs can generate a few notable issues. Let's take a few moments to look at the biggest issues.

- 1. Each program running on your computer is using some of your system memory (RAM). The more programs running, the more RAM is used. When there is no more RAM available, your computer will begin to use your hard disk as a "type" of RAM. Hard disk access is not as fast as RAM access, and when your system has to start using the hard disk as RAM it greatly degrades the performance of your entire system.
- 2. Having more than one of these programs running on your system can result in a software conflict. If both programs are scanning your computer for "malicious activity" there is a high probability they will see each other as "malicious activity" causing a software conflict. This particular problem can be extremely frustrating and can lead to the next very challenging side effect.
- 3. Files necessary to the other scanning program can often be identified as "malicious", and will be quarantined (made inaccessible) or removed, leaving the program corrupted. Trying to repair a program in this condition can be problematic to say the least.
- 4. Finally, maintaining the licensing and updates for your programs can be time consuming and expensive. I am a firm believer that "less is better".

What to Do if You Suspect Infection

There is no guaranteed way to keep malware out. Installing and using antivirus and antispyware software, along with a healthy dose of "common sense" is a good start. But what does it look like when these tools fail? And what can you do about it? The following may indicate your computer is infected with malware:

- Lots of pop-up windows or unexpected messages on your screen
- Unexpected toolbars appear in your web browser
- New icons or programs appear on your computer
- Your web browser home page changes or you are redirected unexpectedly to unknown websites
- Your computer suddenly seems slow, freezes, or crashes during regular use

If you suspect infection, you should:

- Download the most recent definitions for your antivirus and antispyware software
- Run a full scan using both tools (this will usually be much more in-depth and will take longer than the regular monitoring scans)
- Follow the software's instructions to remove suspected malware

If removing malware this way doesn't work, or if the malware returns when you reboot your computer, you should seek professional help from a qualified computer service provider. There are a few qualified local service providers, but PSA, LLC offers a "no-fix, no-pay" work guarantee - most shops do not. Call us at (707) 506-6228 for service.

Conclusion

No home or business can do without malware protection. While nothing is a guarantee against infection, antivirus and antispyware software, coupled with common sense, can go a long way towards protecting your computer.

Burns' year of planning involves requesting prizes from businesses for raffles, and ordering seven trophies, which she gets from Cindy Datewilder, owner at Ferndale Jewelers. "She's an amazing lady," Burns says, who designs the trophies herself, and sponsors one.

The show starts with sign ins from 9 to 11 a.m., after which cars are on display until 2 p.m. At 2:30, trophies are awarded and raffle tickets, sold to the car owners, are drawn for prizes. "By 3:30, we are done," she says. The trophies are awarded by the people who donate them, such as Diane and Steve Harris, who sponsor the **Ruby Holmes Memorial Tro**phy, awarded to a local car and named for the owner of a Scotia coffee shop destroyed in the 1992 earthquake and fire, who lived in Rio Dell for many years.

Kreations each year sponsors the best of show trophy and picks the winner. Others selecting a car for a category include the police officers' association and the fire chief. The car owners vote on a favored car and there's a peoples' choice award. "The car owners enjoy it," she says of the feeling of visiting and reconnecting that takes place during the event, "it's like a family." Proceeds from the event benefit youth athletics. "I have a passion for that," Burns says, noting whether it's physical athletics or the chess team, she believes that activities that occupy the mind and body help keep kids off the streets.

The parade starts at noon Saturday with the line-up at Dr. Chin's dental office at Belleview and Wildwood, starting at 10:30 a.m. to allow time for judging. There will be prizes in three categories, sponsored by Coast Central Credit Union. The theme *It's All About the Children* honors Ernie Cannady, who passed in spring and was active coaching youth sports as well as working at the Rio Dell schools.
