Holiday doings unfurl

Here are three ways to celebrate the season with friends and neighbors:

Come Dec. 3 to the opening of the Community Resource Center at its new location combined with the annual tree lighting. It all takes place 4 to 6 p.m. at 406 Wildwood, on the corner of Wildwood and Columbus in Rio Dell, where the Chamber of Commerce now shares space with the newly relocated Community Resource Center. Check it out – your old favorites: enjoying the downtown decorations and the fire truck parade; meeting Santa; caroling; visiting with your friends and neighbors plus a chance to see the Resource Center in its new home. Sarah Reback, the center's coordinator, says, "I am very excited to get our new location up and running. Please join us for refreshments and decorate an ornament to be hung on our center's tree." And around 5:30, the tree on the median, provided by Humboldt Redwood Company, will be lit.

Register to win cash prizes in the second-annual holiday decorating contest open to everyone in Rio Dell and Scotia. There are business and residential categories. Businesses can choose whether to be judged on indoor or outdoor decorations. As with last year, the \$1,000 in prizes was donated by the volunteer fire department. The first prize is \$250; second prize is \$150, and third prize is \$100 in each of the two categories. A "Chamber's Choice" business prize will be offered as well.

Go to the Rio Dell Scotia Chamber of Commerce Facebook page and fill out the form under "Events" to register your home or business to be judged, OR go to the chamber office, 406 Wildwood, and leave your name, street address, city, phone number, and category for which you are entering, on a sheet of paper you can deposit through the drop-off slot on the Columbus side of the building. You need to do this by midnight, December 15.

A map showing the addresses and locations (but not the names or phone numbers) of the people who register will then be created and posted on the Facebook page and made available on paper at the Chamber door for pickup. Anyone can vote, voting continues until midnight December 25, and votes will then be tabulated, and winners announced

Check out the homes and businesses in the decorating competition and vote for your favorites! Join friends and family in enjoying the holiday lights and other decorations. Those homes and businesses in Rio Dell and Scotia that have signed up to be part of the judging will be mapped and listed on the chamber's Facebook page and a paper version will be available on the front door of the chamber at 406 Wildwood just as soon as humanly and technologically possible after the December 15 deadline to sign up has passed.

Grab the list and set out to see what seasonal delights await and cast your vote by midnight on Christmas – on the Facebook page or by paper, with paper tallies needing to be dropped off at the chamber office, through the slot on the Columbus side of the building at 406 Wildwood, by midnight on Christmas.

Chamber memberships and ads in this free, monthly newsletter expire this month, so be part of all the things the chamber is doing and sign up to renew (or join or re-join) now! First two of four kiosks placed

Delayed by darned near everything, the installation of the first two kiosks of four gifted to the chamber by the Eagle Prairie Arts District during Covid were set in concrete last month, one at Triangle Park near city hall and the other by the library. PG&E urges free in-home gas inspections

With colder weather months approaching, Pacific Gas and Electric Company (PG&E) is reminding customers to call to schedule a free in-home safety inspection of their gas appliances. During the visit, PG&E will also relight pilot lights for customers who have heaters or other appliances that have been turned off during warmer months.

Inspections help ensure that gas appliances, including water heaters, furnaces and ovens, are operating safely and efficiently, reducing the risk of carbon monoxide poisoning within the home. Carbon monoxide is especially dangerous as it can't be seen, smelled or heard. <u>According to the Center for Disease Control</u>, every year in the U.S. at least 430 people die from accidental carbon monoxide poisoning and approximately 50,000 people will be sent to the hospital. Region addresses concerns with power availability

Editor's Note: This article by City Manager Kyle Knopp summarizes a critical issue to the area.

In March of this year, Rio Dell Mayor Debra Garnes attended a meeting of the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC), a state agency with regulatory oversight over Pacific Gas & Electric (PG&E). Her attendance was the culmination of years of missed timelines, commitments and unclear direction from PG&E over development projects in Rio Dell at the Humboldt-Rio Dell Business Park. Mayor Garnes voiced the community's frustration that after five years of proactive communication from the city and developers, no progress had been made on delivery of services to future projects that would help develop the site and provide jobs and revenue to the community. The city council also issued a letter to the CPUC on May 3 further requesting action.

On June 6 the city received formal communication from the CPUC Commissioner John Reynolds that stated "PG&E should be as transparent as possible about the timeline and next steps with local governments." Representatives with PG&E were copied on the communication. City staff then met with Dr. Naveed Paydar, an executive with the CPUC, to develop a strategy to approach PG&E. PG&E agreed to meet with the City of Rio Dell and Dr. Paydar along with staff from the CPUC on September 15. Interestingly, PG&E also scheduled phone calls with the City of Fortuna and County of Humboldt around the same time, without the CPUC invited.

As has been documented in numerous media outlets, the "transparency" finally revealed to the City of Rio Dell, Fortuna and the county involved a stark and distressing story.

At the time, the utility said it could "cost more than \$900 million and take up to a decade" to make the upgrades necessary to increase capacity for two of its three transmission lines. The utility's perceived shortcomings in not anticipating and addressing this issue earlier has roiled the plans, and the tempers, of many who are potentially affected, from city leaders seeing economic development efforts quashed and climate action plans (which rely on migrating fleet vehicles from gas-powered to electric) tossed to the wind; to builders, growers, and private investors who have counted on being able to hook up homes and businesses that are under construction.

After Rio Dell and the CPUC had compelled PG&E to provide answers, it became clear that the issue did not just impact Rio Dell, but Fortuna and the entirety of the unincorporated Southern Humboldt area. Under the leadership of Supervisor Michelle Bushnell and State Senator Mike McGuire, a subsequent "all hands on deck" meeting was called by the senator that brought representatives from Rio Dell, Fortuna and the county together with CPUC and PG&E representatives. At that September meeting it was clearly communicated to PG&E that its update was not acceptable and that it was to return before the end of the month to provide greater detail and better solutions regarding these issues.

PG&E again met with working group of representatives from Rio Dell, Fortuna and the County on October 24 to provide that update. The good news was relayed that both Fortuna and Rio Dell would have additional capacity installed by the end of 2024, alleviating the concerns for development in the two communities. However, the unincorporated Southern Humboldt area would continue to see challenges for some time to come, in certain cases requiring a \$300 million investment to serve just 37 new customers.

"We're grateful to PG&E for sharpening their pencils and prioritizing the Rio Dell and Fortuna areas for enhanced capacity and growth in the coming years." Rio Dell City Manager Kyle Knopp stated. "This is in stark contrast to our meeting with them in September and means our developers now know the timeline for power delivery, and it appears satisfactory to them. I want to thank Mayor Garnes, the CPUC, Senator McGuire and Supervisor Bushnell for bringing PG&E to the table and coming to the resolution."

Scotia Band member enters 51st year

Phil Sams of Ferndale celebrated his 50th year with chamber member Scotia Band last summer. Each year Scotia Band honors its members with a pin for every five years of participation, Emily Silver explained in a news release marking the event. Phil Sams' pin "entered him into an elite league including Henry Bender, Merle Adams, Charles Langdon, Al Pollard, Woody Thompson, and, most recently, Cecil Williams."

Sams, 62, noted music was easy for him, starting with piano lessons at home in the second grade and continuing when he joined the Ferndale Elementary School band in the sixth grade where he opted to play trombone. Silver notes this is often considered one of the most difficult instruments to learn because "while other brass instruments have valves to distinguish note from note, the trombone has a slide. The slide's physical position must be memorized for each note."

From there Sams moved to the baritone (a valved instrument voiced between bass and tenor) when the Ferndale Elementary band teacher loaned him one to take home for the summer, and by fall he had taught himself to play. He began attending Scotia Band rehearsals on Monday nights where he played the baritone while continuing to play the trombone in the school band.

He left Humboldt County for college and pharmacy school but returned to Ferndale to raise a family with his wife, Lani, also a pharmacist, and participate in numerous musical groups, including serving as pianist for his church, playing in the Eureka Symphony, and continuing to anchor the Scotia Band brass section with trombone, baritone, and euphonium, a medium-sized, 3 or 4-valve, tenor-voiced brass instrument similar to a tuba but slightly higher in range which he taught to his wife.
