The Chamber of Commerce will once again produce the parade, the theme of which is *Lest We Forget*, honoring the 100th anniversary of Armistice Day, now called Veterans Day, which marked the end of World War I, and veterans from all wars. The parade will be Saturday, Aug. 4 at noon. All veterans from the Eel River Valley are invited to participate and should gather at Dr. Shin's dental office on Belleview Ave. just off Wildwood in Rio Dell at 11:30 a.m. to get in the parade lineup. Participants will be able to walk, ride a float, or ride in provided cars as needed.

For others wishing to enter a float or other unit in the parade, there will be three categories for which one might choose to compete: Best Theme-Related Entry, Best Vehicle Entry and Best Overall Entry. As always, anyone not wanting to compete can enter, anyway, and participation is free. Applications can be downloaded from the chamber's website, riodellscotiachamber.org, or request by emailing rdschamber@gmail.com. Applications are needed so there is a description to be read by the emcee as the parade passes the reviewing stand.

Following the parade, there will be a tree planting ceremony in Memorial Park, across Wildwood Avenue from City Hall, at 1:30 p.m. The tree has been donated by Mark and Jenny Gillam of Rio Dell to honor veterans.

A plaque will be provided by the memorial tree program of Saving Hallowed Grounds, a historic preservation and commemoration non-profit organization that has been working for the past four years nationally to mark the centennial of the First World War. The ceremony will include the raising of the flag on a 30-foot pole set up for the occasion, a 21-gun salute by the Mad River Community Honor Guard, music by the Dixie Gators band, and taps, played by a team of local buglers. Refreshments will be served. Those wanting to donate a pan of bars or some cookies for this occasion would be gratefully appreciated.

Meet a Silver Member:

Humboldt Redwood Company

Humboldt Redwood Timberland and Sawmill, a silver member of the Rio Dell-Scotia Chamber of Commerce, is glad to be providing over 300 local, family wage jobs in Humboldt County, notes John Andersen, director of forest policy.

Environmental concerns are important, as well, he notes. Since the inception of sister company Mendocino Redwood, the company has sought to restore its redwood forest through thirdparty, uneven-aged, selection harvesting within the guidelines of the Forest Stewardship Council, as well as incorporating watercourse improvements and wildlife protection.

HRC has a major impact in the local economy, Anderson points out. In 2017 the firm spent over \$110 million buying local logs and hiring local contractors to cut and haul them, plus its own logs, to the Scotia mill.

HRC employees, meanwhile, received over \$20 million in wages plus another \$6 million in benefits. Most of this money stays in the local community, buying groceries, gas, entertainment and paying rents or mortgages, supporting thousands of related jobs. Additionally, more than \$25 million was spent on supplies, services and materials in support of HRC forest and sawmill operations.

"All told over \$150 million moves into the local Humboldt economy from our forest and sawmill operations, with most of those dollars flowing to thousands of local employees, contractors, government services and independent service providers," Andersen says.

He concludes, "Our forest management, considered alongside our investment in upgrading the Scotia sawmill with over \$30 million in capital improvements, plus the recent acquisition of the Scotia power plant represents our long-term commitment to a fully integrated, sustainable and healthy business for the long haul."
