Chamber joins effort to promote wildlife, tourism, art



The Rio Dell-Scotia Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring an otter statue, one of 108 that were commissioned across the tri-county area in a wide-ranging program called North Coast Otters, each painted individually by a local artist. "Our" otter is moving around our communities this summer to provide an opportunity for locals as well as travelers to see it, before it and the others are sold in an online auction this fall to raise funds for environmental and other programs at Humboldt State.

Watch for signs in the windows at the Chamber of Commerce office, 406 Wildwood, as well as liking the chamber's Facebook page, to see where the otter is each week. If you want to bring the otter to your business, call 707.506.5081 or email <u>rdschamber@gmail.com</u>. The program was conceived before Covid and was paused for a year. Publicity surrounding the program is designed to bring travelers into participating businesses to see the art, shoot photos of themselves with it, and engage in the effort to protect and preserve our environment and wildlife. There's a kids' program and a citizen science component to the effort, and a booklet showing all 108 of the statues and their locations that people can follow on their own art crawl.

The otter statue was delivered to Rio Dell over Memorial Day weekend and first took up residence at Root 101 Nursery and Wildwood Waffles, 770 Wildwood Avenue. Our otter was painted by Augustus Clark, who grew up in Rio Dell and graduated from Fortuna High in 1991 and from UC-Santa Cruz where he majored in studio art. His studio is at 208 C Street in Eureka, open by appointment. Termed "Mr. Prolific" in a *Times-Standard* interview a couple years ago for the number of paintings he has done, Clark has also gone into other genres including animation, and his work can be seen on some utility boxes in Eureka. Scotia non-profit offers lawn-care, janitorial service to public

Reaching For Independence (RFI) has moved to Scotia and is seeking to expand its customer base and fill a couple job openings. The nonprofit provides employment support and life skill education to its clients, adults with developmental disabilities and autism. RFI purchased four units in the Scotia Mall and moved from its former Fortuna base in April of last year. It occupies three of those units and the fourth is the home of Palco Pharmacy.



Formed in 2005, the organization has 60 clients in Del Norte and Humboldt counties doing lawn care and janitorial work for RFI customers and continues to expand, according to Executive Director Jeff Pockett. All RFI clients are paid minimum wage or higher, Pockett says. When community members or local businesses hire an RFI crew, they get a full team of up to three clients and a job coach. Crew rates for janitorial work start at \$48.75 and for lawn care, \$60 per hour. The benefits to hiring a lawn care or janitorial crew through RFI are that a customer gets up to four people working at one time.

Pockett explains how it works: "The job coach is there to provide direction and supervision, but also to assist in tasks that the client has difficulty accomplishing. When someone hires a house cleaner (Continued on Page 4.)

You've got Spam!

By: Rebekah Long PSA Computer Services www.psa.-2.com Getting spam is a hassle. No argument there, but what's even worse than that? Unknowingly sending it. When fake, unverified, and potentially virus-ridden emails go out with your email address, it can look bad. And not only do you look bad, but you also have to deal with the emails that bounce back due to dead addresses.



There's one reassurance in all of this, and that is you are not actually sending out spam, and your computer and IP address are still safe. Unfortunately, there is still some bad news. If spam is being sent from your email address, your address is either "spoofed" or "hijacked." Either way the spam isn't coming from your computer, and probably not from the bad actor's computer either. It's probably being sent from someone's malware-infected PC – and they probably don't even know they've been hacked!

Spoofing an address is when someone sends out email with your address written in as the sender, even though they don't actually have access to your email account. Unfortunately, as of now, there are no remedies to spoofing. There is no way to tell who sent them, and no way to stop it from happening. Fortunately, these bad actors tend to change the email addresses they spoof often, and they will move on from your email address eventually. Your email service provider may administratively block your email address for a period of time when it notices the large amount of email being sent from your email account. If this happens, you will need to contact them to "unblock" your email address.

Hijacking can be much more devastating. In the case of a hijacking the criminal takes control of your email account. This includes that person having the ability to read your email, which can then be used to specifically target people in your contacts. When you've been hijacked, a bad actor can also lock you out of your own account. Thank-fully, unlike spoofing, something can be done about hijacking. If you can still receive email, try logging into your email account on another computer or by using your internet browser's private mode. When the login fails, try the service's "Forgot your password?" or "Need help?" link. The service will email you a password reset link. You will need to get it before the bad actor. If that fails you'll have to contact your email service provider and explain the problem. If you have access to the internet then perform an internet search similar to "I can't sign into my Gmail account" or "I can't sign into my Outlook account" or the name of whatever email service you use. This should get you to a support page.

If you've been using the same password for other services you should change those as soon as possible to stop the hacker from moving onto other services you use. Once you have everything back under control, don't forget to email apologies to everyone who received spam from your email address.

Here are four things you can do to help prevent your accounts from being hacked in the future:

- 1. Use passwords that are 9 characters or more. Utilize upper and lowercase letters,
- numbers and a special character or two (if allowed).
- 2. Use different passwords for each different account (don't be lazy, you'll regret it later!)
- 3. If the account offers multi-factor authentication, use it.
- 4. Do not send passwords in emails ever!

With RFI's crew that time can be cut, so customers can get more done for the money while also knowing they are helping provide employment to people with a developmental disability. It really is a win all around!

As a community-based support program, RFI works to integrate its clients into all aspects of community life, Pockett notes, adding the organization is excited about its new Scotia home and looking forward to working with local business and community members to expand the scope of opportunities for the clients it serves.

"The Scotia Mall space was perfect for us. Everything we need is here in this beautiful town, and we really look forward to working with area businesses and being able to provide our services to members of the community."

Currently, RFI is looking for lawn care customers in the Scotia and Rio Dell area and has a few openings for people wanting to assist in providing client support and supervision.

Pockett loves the outdoors, hiking, biking, camping, and exploring Humboldt. "I have worked for RFI for 12.5 years and have been the executive director for seven years. Before moving to Humboldt County in 2008 I spent 10 years working for The Salvation Army in Southern California in youth summer camp programming and as a church and community center director," he says.

Scotia school sees two long-term staffers retire

Two members of the Scotia school staff retired last month at the close of the school year: Sandra Close, with the district for 40 years, mostly teaching first grade, and Gayle McKnight, cafeteria managers and classroom paraprofessional with 31 years of service. Both women have been active in the Parent-Teacher Organization, and both were honored by the Humboldt County Office of Education for their dedication and service.

Close is known for her work teaching reading– not just in class but during summers, and not just to those she was assigned to, but anyone struggling, Scotia school superintendent Amy Gossien notes. She was a reading expert and a mentor to other teachers, Gossien said, and made learning fun, mixing academics with crafts, treats, and love. Close hatched chicks, butterflies, and ladybugs among other critters in her classroom; provided food for her students and their families for an annual Thanksgiving feast; and could be counted on for Grandparent Day, school carnival, and other events, and to help anyone in need. With her husband, Wally, she gave selflessly to the school and its children, Gossien said.

McKnight started the school-based cafeteria program, set up the new cafeteria, and started the breakfast service and supper programs, Gossien notes, adding that she went "above and beyond to ensure fresh, healthy food for her charges." McKnight coordinated efforts like the Harvest of the Month and the walking/running club. She secured the California Grown Fresh School Meals grant for the school greenhouse, the first grant of this kind that went to a Humboldt area school, and set up the garden which before Covid restrictions, supplied fruits and vegetables for the salad bar. The local chapter of the California Native Plant Society donated a half-dozen native plant varieties this year for a pollinator garden at the school which led to the organization bringing plants to other school gardens in the area. During the Spring, 2020 school closure, McKnight served meals to the community.
