Future Antiques to open in former Bigfoot location

Darlene Jamack has opened a second-hand shop in the site formerly occupied by Bigfoot New and Recycled Treasures, at 220 Wildwood in Rio Dell. Called Future Antiques ("because in the future all these things will be antique," she explains) it is described as "a book store and more."

Clothes, furniture, jewelry and other items fill out the roster of items for sale, aside from books CDs, DVDs and VHS videos. Jamack plans to donate a portion of her profit to Friends of the Rio Dell Library, because the library has only book sales for income, and must pay for utilities.



She says she will be picky about what she sells, preferring items people can use over knick-knacks and looks forward to getting good quality items from sources such as storage auctions and garage sales and selling them at low prices. "It will be a perpetual garage sale," she envisions, with new items all the time. She plans to be open 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. Thursday through Sunday. Daughter Brie, 35, will be her partner in the venture and have an office in the back where she can help out.

Jamack was in the flea market business 40 years, she says, and has sold second-hand items from Key West to Anchorage. She had yard sales at her home when she lived on Pacific Avenue in Rio Dell, and when moving to her current home on Monument last fall, told friends that instead of having yard sales, her goal was to open a store. "Location is important," she says, and enjoys having parking, an accessible facility, and being on the sunny side of the street.

HARDCAR drives new venture supporting veterans

A new business emerging in Rio Dell is HARDCAR, a cannabis distribution business, so named because it uses armored vehicles to transport product from growers to processing facilities and then to retail sites. Morgan Dodson, corporate analyst, is the local representative. HARDCAR was formed three years ago by a pair of military veterans with security and logistics backgrounds who designed the vehicles, which are typically Ford bodies built out with armor and cameras to their specifications. The company has 25 employees in California, but is growing so rapidly nationwide, with facilities in 11 states, that Dodson doesn't hazard a guess at the company's total headcount.

Locally, HARDCAR is focusing on establishing a hub site to offer secure transport and distribution to other locations in California as well as cash processing. Dodson works out of the Chamber of Commerce office space at 406 Wildwood Ave., Rio Dell, studying market opportunities for the company and reaching out to potential clients. A county native who moved away to serve in the Navy and study finance and marketing, she lives with her husband and family in Scotia, and is delighted to be part of the community, able to walk and bicycle to so many places and enjoy the peaceful pace of life the area offers.

A major focus of HARDCAR is to support military veterans. The drivers are veterans, as are most of the other employees. Part of the company's emphasis is to raise funds for research into cannabinoid (CBD) products that help treat post traumatic stress disorder. Another effort is to plant 22 trees in communities to remind people that on average 22 veterans commit suicide every day, and the need to reach out and offer support to people in crisis. Dodson has carried out this mission with a total of 22 tree plantings in Scotia, at the new campus of the Multi-Generational Center in Fortuna, and at City Hall and Memorial Park in Rio Dell. When the trees have been established, plaques will be placed at the tree groupings and a map prepared that will show the location of the trees. (Continued on Page 3)

Wind energy plan up for review

The draft environmental impact report in response to the proposal of Humboldt Wind, LLC for a conditional use permit to construct and operate a wind farm on area adjacent to the Town of Scotia is available for review at the Rio Dell library, Scotia Community Services District office and at this webpage

Public comment on this document is invited for a 45-day period ending June 5.

The proposed project consists of a maximum of 60 wind turbine generators and associated infrastructure with the potential to power 60,000 homes simultaneously. The project site is approximately 2,218 acres. The exact footprint would be determined during final engineering design but would generally be placed along Monument and Bear River ridges. Turbine heights could reach up to 600 feet tall, with a rotor diameter of 492 feet.

The environmental impact analysis is based on a maximum number of wind turbine generators that may be placed within the boundaries of the project site. In addition, the project includes temporary staging areas, access roads, 34.5-kilovolt (kV) collection lines; an operations and maintenance facility, a substation, a modified utility switchyard, a 115 kV line along Shively Ridge and a line that will run for about 17 miles and require a 24-foot-wide service road, connecting to the Pacific Gas & Electric Company transmission grid at the Bridgeville Substation. The portion of the connecting line going across the Eel River would be underground.

There will be a component of the project involving an offloading location at Fields Landing; two temporary bypasses off U.S. 101 (Hookton Overpass and 12th Street Bypass) for transporting oversize loads; up to six permanent meteorological towers; and three 5-acre, temporary staging areas distributed throughout the project site, one of which would include one temporary cement batch plant on Monument Ridge.

The draft report identifies significant impacts in areas that include aesthetics and visual resources, air quality; biological resources; cultural resources; hazards and hazardous materials; hydrology and water quality, noise and vibration; transportation and circulation, tribal cultural resources and wildfire, according to a communication from Terra Gen, the company seeking to undertake the project, which goes on to say many of these impacts can be fully mitigated but some cannot, and would remain significant and unavoidable.

Alex notes the youth pastor role involves helping children build up precepts to help them in life, including a passion for prayer and for reading the Bible. The couple is planning a family event to honor mothers following the 10 a.m. church service on May 12, Mother's Day.
