Area fire departments propose merger

A series of outreach events in early November will seek to inform residents of area communities about a proposal to merge four area fire departments (see Notes and News, pg. 2 for more). Rio Dell chief Shane Wilson explains that, while such talks have happened in the past, action earlier this year by the Humboldt County Board of Supervisors presented a new, fiscally feasible path to achieve the goal.

The county is a patchwork of fire districts with gaps in their coverage, Wilson explained, and departments routinely cover areas outside their jurisdiction but often are not reimbursed for those efforts. The county measure, called the Property Tax Revenue Sharing Agreement, established a way for the districts to effectively synch up their borders to avoid coverage gaps and establish a sustainable funding mechanism.

The proposed merger would combine departments from Rio Dell to Redcrest, and extend Rio Dell's western fire district borders to meet those of Ferndale. For Rio Dell, there will be no visible change, Wilson said, except the department would have more equipment and staffing options. Existing agreements with Ferndale and Fortuna departments will provide back-up coverage as before, should the department need to support fire suppression efforts further south.

Scotia's fire department, once funded by Pacific Lumber Company and now by the Town of Scotia LLC (as opposed to the Community Services District), is private and would be without a funding source when the properties are sold under Phase 3 of the transition plan, at which time the Town of Scotia corporation goes away. "Scotia responds to fires in Stafford and Shively out of the goodness of their hearts," Wilson said, but doesn't receive funds for calls outside of Scotia.

The Rio Dell department has helped launch a fire fighting group in Shively with training and surplus equipment, to provide closer and faster coverage to that area. Redcrest's fire-fighting group, meanwhile, is a non-profit which holds fund-raisers to cover its expenses, Wilson continued, raising about \$9,000 per year – estimated to increase under the merger to \$50,000 per year.

Under the proposed merger, the three communities – Scotia, Shively and Redcrest – would assess homes in their service area at the same rate that Rio Dell (and most fire departments in the county) now do, a fee that for many would be 100/year. Wilson notes the formula equates to 25/year for one unit, defined as a vacant house lot. A typical one-family house in town is defined as being four units (100/year) while other situations have various other allocations of units assigned to them – a rural residential parcel is six units, for instance, or 150 per year, and more is charged for properties in areas not served by a municipal water line. Resource Center sets holiday food distributions

The Community Recourse Center will be providing holiday food baskets to qualifying individuals and families who come to the food pantry on Nov. 21 for their Thanksgiving basket, and Dec. 19 for Christmas. The hours for both will be 9 a.m. to noon. A protein and larger than usual vegetable portion will be included in each basket. Individuals new to the pantry can self-certify that their income is at or below the required level \$1,561.25 per month for one person, or \$2,113.75 for two persons; for each additional person in the household, add \$552.50 of monthly income. Foods have been purchased with monies received from grants.

Help restock the food pantry

Barrels will be out in the post offices in Rio Dell and Scotia and in Root 101 Nursery to accept food donations Nov. 4 through Dec. 17 to build up the food pantry supplies with items for holiday baskets and restocking into next year.

Check out these giving opportunities to help area families

The Community Resource Center is working with Toys for Tots to provide gifts for needy families this December. Those wishing to donate stocking stuffer items may buy them at, or bring them to, Dollar General in Rio Dell where a donation bin will be available. Larger gifts are only being accepted for children ages 15 to 18, for whom no other source of gifts is available. Sara Faught of the resource center says popular and affordable items for young people in this age group are hoodies, gift certificates to area shops and blue tooth speakers.

Families can get help with gifts for children

Families wishing help providing holiday gifts for their children this year may complete an application in advance at either the Rio Dell or Scotia school office or at the Community Resource Center in Rio Dell, stating the name, age and other information about the child for whom the gift is intended, to aid in selection of appropriate items. Gifts will be provided through the Toys for Tots program operated by the U.S. Marine Corps, and will be directed to families with an application on file based on the child's age, size and gender. Gifts may be picked up locally on Dec. 14 at the Rio Dell Baptist Church between noon and 4 p.m. The person picking up will need a photo ID to establish it is the family member applying.

A second funding source as a result of the merger is that the Scotia-to-Redcrest current districts would also be able to receive funds, as Rio Dell's fire district now does, from the state, collected through property taxes. Those funds, received by the county, are sent to the state and then paid out to entities such as school districts and fire districts and are seen as a line item on the tax bills property owners pay. That amount – or the property tax in general – will not be affected by the merger, Wilson says.

There are several steps to go and a timeline to be followed. Contracts are being reviewed by attorneys, apparatus from the various departments that would be brought to the merger is being appraised, and the plan is to go to the Humboldt Local Area Formation Committee (LAFCO), an organization that oversees the orderly growth and changes of agencies such as water, fire and community service districts, in the spring of 2020.

Wilson points out how valuable Measure Z funding has been in this effort, enabling the retaining of county staff to expedite the complex process, and also to pay the fees involved – the LAFCO fee alone is \$10,000.

Kiwanis elects new officers, names goals

The Rio Dell-Scotia chapter of Kiwanis International celebrated its first anniversary earlier this year and looks to the future with a full slate of plans. Goals for the year include getting a greenhouse at Rio Dell elementary, remodeling the snack shack with the volunteer fire department at the Firemen's Park in Rio Dell, and possibly starting a Builders Club, a middle-schoolaged Kiwanis organization, at one of the two local schools, plus hosting the second annual Fruhlingsfest (a Germanthemed beer festival) in March and participating in Wildwood Days again. Movies in the park, a monthly series started this summer, is also on the docket for next summer, as well as creating an increased awareness of the Kiwanis organization for those unaware of what it does, through greater outreach.

Dana Webb, a Kiwanis member since age 10, who grew up locally and was among the group that first established the local chapter, notes she is most proud of how the community has responded to Kiwanis, supporting its events and donating to its activities, adding that the membership is a mix of long-time residents and those newer to the community, providing a range of ideas.

"Kiwanis's main goal is to be a service organization specifically focused around helping children -- one child, one community at a time," she says.
