which she works, from whimsical sculptures to prints of retro airplanes and trucks, to animals wild and domestic. "I'm into history right now," she says, inspired by the old logging photos she has seen. Born at Scotia hospital, she recalls the floods of 1955 and 1964, standing on the bluff in Fortuna and seeing the expanse of water rolling by, carrying homes and animals. Walker has recently relocated to Rio Dell after stints in Florida and Minnesota, spanning the past 15 years, and has a space at the Eagle Prairie Arts District gallery, 406 Wildwood Ave., Rio Dell. She works in fibers, sculpts in papier mache, and likes colored pencils to produce prints. "I was doing art since I could pick up a pencil," she says, and enjoys making felted animals, like sheep, and doing portraits of people and pets. Her studio is "wherever I happen to be," and she carries a sketch book, a valued suggestion from an art instructor. "I haven't had a lot of formal education," she says, beyond art classes in high school and College of the Redwoods, and at the Minnesota River School of Fine Arts when she lived in the Midwest, but she's been fortunate in those settings to have good teachers. Rio Dell Police Chief Retires

Rio Dell police Chief Graham Hill retired Aug. 1 after 22 years with the police department, 13 of them as chief, making him the city's longest-serving police officer and longest-serving chief. Hill was honored at the Aug. 1 city council meeting where members of the public thanked him for his service as they also did on the Chamber of Commerce Facebook page, where the retirement was announced, and in the comments section of online media covering the retirement. Chief Hill was, and still is a pillar of our community creating an atmosphere within the Rio Dell PD of service to the community, anyone in town felt comfortable speaking with Graham in uniform or not. Chief Hill has developed a department that other communities across this nation strive to achieve.

Sergeant John Beauchaine, a 14-year veteran of the department, will serve as the interim police chief until a new chief is selected.

Faces Change in Rio Dell: Long-time Dentist Retires



Dr. Ralph Roberts has sold his dental practice, after more than 50 years in Rio Dell. "It's time, he's 83," smiles his wife, Rita, of his retirement. Dr. Roberts is known internationally for his use of a style of dental implant called a ramus frame which involves embedding a titanium rail in the bone of the patient's lower jaw on which a lower denture can rest. This technique is done when the bone in the lower jaw has receded and there is no support for the denture. Other implants are used for the permanent attachment of smaller numbers of replacement teeth and even a single tooth. The more complex procedure involves anesthesia and a

half-day office visit to insert the rail, followed by some time allowing the gum to heal before the dentures are applied.

Dr. Roberts has lectured throughout the U.S., England and Germany, as well as hosted dental professionals at his office to share his knowledge of the technique. A framed research award on his wall was presented in 2015 by the American Academy of Implant Dentistry Foundation. "People say he's a genius," his wife says, smiling her agreement.

After college, a stint in the military and dental school at Loma Linda University in Southern California, Dr. Roberts was recruited in the mid-1960s by Lane Thomsen, a Rio Dell dentist who knew him from dental school and promised he had plenty of work to keep another dentist busy. Rita Roberts notes that she prefers small towns and rural areas to the big city.

Dr. Thomsen later returned to Loma Linda to teach in the dental school, while the Roberts' settled in the large farm house where they live now on Rio Dell Avenue. "There was vacant land next to it on which to build the office," Rita Roberts says of the two-story structure where four assistants and technicians work. She did the bookwork for the practice, as well as serving as treasurer at the Fortuna Junior Academy for many years.

The couple, married for 60 years, has raised four daughters who live in Hawaii, Maine and Texas, with one remaining locally. Three grandchildren live in Texas. Interested in helping others, Dr. Roberts has collected dental equipment from offices that close and sent them to places in need, in Africa, the Philippines and the Ukraine, where he helped set up a dental clinic with one of his brothers, also a dentist, and to which he traveled often. He served on the Rio Dell city council and was mayor for a term. Continued on page 4.

Member Feature: Eureka Payments, Based on Trust



"It's hard to believe we've been in business seven years" president Ken Musante says of Eureka Payments, the business he and two partners, Steve Kimberling and Scott Bartlett, formed in 2010 to handle credit, debit, gift card and EBT (electronic benefit transfer) transactions for businesses, governmental entities and schools.

Musante founded Humboldt Merchant Services in 1993, which came to have \$5 billion in transactions with 100,000 clients. Kimberling and Bartlett had key responsibilities in the management team there. When a series of changes

found them working for a large company "that did things the way big companies do," they went out on their own.

Eureka Payments serves 1300 clients in a territory from Medford, Oregon to Garberville from its Eureka office, where three staff members work along with the three partners, and from a Medford office, where another person is employed. Another couple hundred clients operate in an online environment outside the region, together comprising a volume equal to the larger group in the county.

Future growth will come from increasing the clientele in the region, Musante notes, rather than expanding into other areas. "We let our clients use our equipment free of charge, and provide a free supply of receipt tape," he says of the need to be in contact with the firms who use their service. When credit card companies replaced their cards with one embedded with "the chip," Eure-ka Payments provided clients with equipment at its own cost to handle the new technology.

"We are selling trust," Musante says of the business philosophy. "Our clients aren't bound by contracts, there's no upfront cost to join so they can leave if they want. We appreciate our customers. Our goal is to leave them better off than we find them." He advises that the business best able to gain from the relationship is one doing \$2,000 or more per month in sales. "If their sales are below that, I tell them to use the Square," he says of another credit card payment system.

While credit card payments are the core competency of Eureka Payments, other companies offer the service, including banks. However, three financial institutions – Redwood Capital Bank, Coast Central Credit Union, and a Garberville credit union, handle credit card transactions through Eureka Payments rather than on their own.

"I'm a big believer in chambers of commerce," Musante says of his firm's membership in many chambers throughout the region. "We are looking for business customers, and that's where to reach them." He notes that contacts are made by potential clients as well as by his firm, where a white board lists leads to follow up.
